
The Murray Mallee Community Legal Service (MMCLS) commenced operating in 1996 and covers more than 120,000 square kms, ten Local Government Areas.

MMCLS is a program of Mallee Family Care, which is the largest welfare not for profit agency, covering the Northern and Southern Mallee of Victoria and South West New South Wales. The co-location model allows the legal service to work collaboratively with over sixty other programs on common issues, to build and support each other in community development initiatives and also to meet the emerging needs of residents in the MMCLS catchment.









Vision

The communities of the Murray Mallee Region have a clear understanding of the legal system and are able to access it to resolve their legal problems.

Mission

To render legal assistance to the most vulnerable members of the Murray Mallee communities. This assistance is offered with due regard to the worth, independence and dignity of each individual. Service provision should reflect a continuing awareness of community needs and the value of community support.

Objectives

- To provide a high quality, free and accessible legal service to the Murray Mallee which will empower and support individuals and communities in the resolution of legal problems and stimulate understanding of the legal system.
- To use community legal education to provide the people of the Murray Mallee region with a better understanding of the role of the Murray Mallee Community Legal Service.
- To promote the Murray Mallee Community Legal Service to isolated and remote areas of the region.
- To provide a high quality and accountable legal service to the Murray Mallee Region based on the human, administrative and financial resources available within and externally to the service.

Manager's Report

I am delighted to present the Annual Report for the Murray Mallee Community Legal Service for the 2018-19 year. This has been the first full year of my involvement with the service, and I continue to be impressed by the resilience, hard work and team spirit of all of the staff. Last year I reported that recruitment of solicitors had been a big focus of my initial work with the service, and I am pleased to report for almost the whole of the past year we have had a full complement of staff. This, together with the appointment of our two new social workers, has enabled us to provide a truly integrated and holistic service to vulnerable clients in both the Northern and Southern Mallee.

During the recruitment of a Principal Solicitor, we have been fortunate that Lauren Dinning stepped in on a part-time basis. Anna Sullivan and Jeri Fung also stepped into higher duties for four months. We were very pleased recently to welcome Mark Boreham into the role of Principal Solicitor. In the short time he has been with us, Mark has promoted a positive and forward looking outlook for the service, encouraging the team to review community need and expand the services we provide, particularly to our more remote communities.

Early in the year new solicitor Emily Craig put her hand up to relocate to Swan Hill, which enabled us to provide much needed support to the Women's Safety Package partnership with the Mallee Domestic Violence Service, as well as to offer a generalist legal service to Swan Hill clients. This eased some of the travel pressure for Mildura staff and allowed for more face to face client contact and a stronger relationship with the courts in Swan Hill and Kerang.

Allie Collyer continues to be a star in her community legal education work. Allie should be commended for the work she did through a grant from the Victoria Law Foundation, to produce two videos for young people about Consent and Sexting. Since the launch of the videos in November Allie has received requests from all over the country for permission to use the materials or to make presentations to schools and to adapt the legal information to be relevant to other states. Allie has described her project in detail in her part of this report, and the videos can be accessed via the MFC and MMCLS web sites, as well as on YouTube. The characters Tom and Amy are now well known young people in love!

In addition to this excellent piece of work, Allie has continued her travels around our region, clocking up 119 community presentations to a whopping 2,977 participants and quite possibly eating nearly as many scones while visiting

Of particular note, Allie has worked with the E-Safety Commissioner to bring their training around cyber-safety in family violence to Mildura and Swan Hill. The use of technology to facilitate family violence is of increasing concern and our support for community education around this is incredibly important.

More than half of the work of the Service now relates to Family Law and/or family violence, often with issues intersecting and involving children as well as adults. Solicitors Anna Sullivan and Blessing Keabilwe have worked together and separately to consolidate our service to women and families and to build our service's capacity in these areas. We have continued to provide a duty lawyer service to both the Magistrates Court in relation to Intervention Orders and the Federal Circuit Court in relation to Family Law matters, with some crossover in cases such as those involving recovery order applications for children. We recently congratulated Blessing on achieving her unrestricted practising certificate, and we are confident of our increasing capacity to provide a quality and holistic service to clients in the family law and family violence systems.

Solicitor Anna Sullivan has continued to focus on Family Law matters, and to provide support to clients seeking resolution of property disputes in the family law system, through our grant from the Victorian Government. Anna has also worked closely with many Mallee Family Care programs, including the Family Relationship Services, to build their capacity to understand Family Law and Family Law Property processes. Further, we have continued to work together with the Family Relationship Service to deliver legal education to Mallee Family Care clients seeking support with separation and co-parenting, as well as with Mallee Family Care's Financial Counselling program for some clients with complex needs. Indeed, being under the auspicing umbrella of Mallee Family Care gives the MMCLS plenty of opportunities to embrace an integrated and holistic approach to service provision.

Our work in family violence has also continued with provision of duty lawyer services to the Mildura, Swan Hill, Kerang and Robinvale courts through the Intervention Order Support Service (IOSS). The solicitors, supported by the social workers, are rostered weekly in Mildura, fortnightly in Swan Hill and monthly in Kerang and Robinvale, and are available to advise and support applicants on the day. Clients repeatedly provide very positive feedback on this service, and Magistrates have often commented on our value at court.

Solicitor Jeri Fung has continued to support young people to access legal advice through our partnerships with Sunraysia TAFE and Mildura Senior College and Chaffey High School. Solicitor Ana Nusrat has further developed our capacity to support clients with employment and credit and debt matters, frequently working together with the Mallee Family Care Financial Counselling team as well as our social work staff.

Australian Law Reform Commission's Review of the Family Law System and are hopeful of reforms which will help to address growing concerns about the safety of parties and their children together with the increasing backlog of matters before the Family Court. In addition our service has also worked with the Federation of Community Legal Services on an Advisory Council in relation to the development of their *Free our Sisters, Free our Kids* advocacy campaign to reduce the numbers of women and children incarcerated in Victoria. The major focus has been on incarceration rates for Indigenous women and children, often resulting from family violence and social and financial disadvantage. The campaign is expected to be implemented over five years.

Family Violence Legal Unit

The Government's continuing strong focus on addressing family violence and increasing its visibility has seen a strengthening of referral pathways for people seeking assistance. Reciprocal referral between the Family Violence Legal Unit (FVLU) and the Mallee Domestic Violence Service - Mallee Sexual Assault Unit (MDVS-MSAU) has assisted us to provide the best holistic care possible for our clients. Solicitor Blessing Keabilwe and Social Worker Brandon Lyell have been embedded in the Mildura MDVS-MSAU, while Solicitor Emily Craig has worked with the service in Swan Hill. More recently, the team has also been supported by Social Worker Nicole Woods, who also works with the generalist legal team in Mildura. The number of clients accessing our Commonwealth funded Family Violence Legal Unit (FVLU) through the Mildura and Swan Hill Family Violence Services has again steadily increased, with higher numbers of appointments, advice and representations for clients all noted.

Working alongside the Sunraysia Ethnic Communities Council (SMECC) and other services, our FVLU has been investigating the ways in which we can work better with culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) people in the Mallee region. InTouch Multicultural Centre Against Family Violence have kindly provided resources and research to the group, which has helped address areas where limited knowledge may be detrimental to clients' needs. Ways in which our service can improve in these areas have been addressed and our FVLU is working towards a more holistic practice with this new knowledge.

Additionally, our work with SMECC in their Strengthening Families project has seen Blessing facilitating information sessions on family violence and the law to CALD community members in an effort to increase their understanding of these areas in Australia. Through a small grant from the Victorian Federation of Community Legal Centres we have

also been able to provide information about our services and family violence in a number of locally used languages, including Fijian, Tongan, Vietnamese, Swahili and Dari.

The MMCLS has developed a working relationship with Umalek Balit, the Koori Family Violence Practitioner Program Pilot in Mildura. Supporting the development and launch of this pilot program and developing a close working relationship with practitioners has seen the development of improved referral pathways for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander clients when attending court.

FVLU staff as well as the General Manager have also been involved in the Northern Mallee Family Violence Operations Network. This is a network of organisations working together to find ways to address the increasing incidence of family violence in our region, but also to find ways to prevent further occurrences. Addressing the invisibility of Family Violence is a high priority for this working group.

Legal and social work staff, together with the General Manager, travelled to Melbourne and Geelong to visit other Community Legal Centres with integrated practice approaches, exchanging ideas about how best to incorporate social workers into the Community Legal Service to achieve wrap-around and holistic services for clients. This was a great networking opportunity and we were able to share some of our ideas about the importance of integrated approaches in rural settings as well as learn

from the experience of other services. The incorporation of social workers into the legal service has been a critically important activity for the service during the past year.

Finally, while providing a critical legal support service for women who are experiencing or escaping family violence, our service has also continued to engage in advocacy for women. Family violence solicitor Blessing Keabilwe, together with the General Manager, have engaged with a campaign organised by the Federation of Community Legal Services to Free our Sisters, Free our Kids, which has provided support to a group of Indigenous women to develop and implement advocacy on behalf of Indigenous women and children who are incarcerated. Indigenous women and children are overrepresented in the numbers who are incarcerated in Australia, as well as in the numbers affected by family violence, and we know that the consequent risk to their wellbeing is high. Often for the women this is because of unpaid fines, or because they have been incorrectly identified as perpetrators of family violence. The campaign is expected to run over five years, with the initial focus on mentoring and building the capacity of the group of Indigenous activist women to plan their activities.

Community Legal Education Report

It has once again been a very productive year for Community Legal Education (CLE). We have continued to target our activities toward people with vulnerabilities or disadvantage in our community – Aboriginal and Torres Straight Islanders, people from culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) backgrounds, seniors, youth, families on low incomes, people living with disabilities and those living in isolated communities.

This year we conducted 109 CLE activities, including 85 presentations and attendances at community events and forums. These were spread across towns in 8 local government areas and included Kerang, Dareton, Wentworth, Swan Hill, Robinvale, Boort, Hopetoun, Pyramid Hill, Woomelang, Birchip, Nhill and Rainbow.

Our lawyers delivered an additional 24 "Your Family Law Options" sessions, in conjunction with the Mildura Family Relationship Centre.

Stakeholder engagement is very important in fostering relationships with other local service providers, promoting our services, sharing information and keeping up to date with local community issues and events. We attended 19 meetings during the year including Local Aboriginal

Justice Advisory Committee (LAJAC) meetings in Mildura and Robinvale, Court User Meetings, Wentworth Shire Interagency and family violence network meetings.

Some of the highlights of the year included:

- Launching the Consent and Relationships project. The development of two short videos targeting young people with intellectual disabilities, with the launch occurring in mid-November. (Refer below)
- Going on the road with the Commonwealth Department of Human Services (Centrelink) Mobile Service Centre in towns in our catchment area in October. As part of this roadshow, we visited Boort, Cohuna, Kerang, Ouyen, Pyramid Hill, Quambatook, Robinvale and Sea Lake. This enabled us to speak to community members who were attending the service centre and promote our services, resulting in a number of referrals for appointments as well as requests for CLE information sessions in Boort and Pyramid Hill in the following months.
- Delivering a keynote session at the Koorie Girls Conference in Mildura. The conference is an opportunity for Koorie girls to be immersed in culture and attend information sessions which encourage them to focus on education and being role models. This year the theme was "future stories" and I developed a presentation around managing

your online reputation.. I contacted April Goldring who was a participant at last year's conference as she is now studying at university in Melbourne and playing football for the Western Bulldogs in the VFLW. April was very happy to be researched via Google, as part of the presentation to demonstrate what a positive digital footprint looks like. The students were extremely engaged, responding positively to seeing a peer and role model they could identify with, being showcased.

- MMCLS organised and hosted presenters from the E-Safety Commission, to deliver information sessions to Community Workers in Mildura, Swan Hill and Kerang. These sessions were attended by a total of 72 community workers and raised awareness of technology-facilitated abuse and provided attendees with up-to-date skills and knowledge to support women and families experiencing technology facilitated abuse.
- Fostering our relationship with Zoe Support, an organisation which supports young mothers with life skills to continue their education. Youth Solicitor Jeri Fung and I delivered monthly information sessions to the young Mums. We have assisted a number of these women with legal appointments following our sessions. We have listened to their legal needs and developed appropriate sessions to empower them with information and avenues for assistance. The presentations have been delivered

during their playgroups which have a vibrant, noisy and nurturing environment.

This role offers great opportunities to travel throughout the region and provide support and services to people living in our most remote areas. By co-ordinating session times, when possible, I can visit several towns over a period of days. For example; I received a request for an information session in Rainbow and contacted organisations in the nearby town of Nhill which resulted in 5 CLE sessions being delivered over 2 days. Another road trip over 3 days saw me delivering 5 sessions in 4 locations; Boort, Pyramid Hill, Hopetoun and Woomelang. I enjoy visiting the more remote parts of our catchment and empowering community members with important information, as well as meeting people from all different backgrounds.

I continue to relish the challenges of this important role and look forward to continuing in 2020. No two days are ever the same. I see the beauty of our landscapes, stumble across magnificent silo art and love engaging with communities to make the law accessible for all.

Consent and Relationships Project

In November 2018, we launched the Consent and Relationships Project which consisted of two animated short videos featuring a teen couple - Tom and Amy - and factsheets and postcards complementing the films.

Through my Community Legal Education work I had a number of contacts with local specialist schools who were concerned with sexual consent and sexting issues they were noticing in some of their students and the lack of appropriate learning tools for them. Following these discussions, I spent time researching materials that were available and found a lack of resources focusing on legal information for these young people.

The concern was that young people with an intellectual disability, or on the Autism speCentreum, could unknowingly be breaking the law. Although many may not be charged with offences, they are not victimless activities without significant legal, social and emotional consequences for the all of the young people involved.

The occurrence of image based abuse (mostly the sharing or creating of intimate images without consent) and sexual assault for people with disabilities are disproportionately high and I wanted to do something about it. Research also shows that people with an intellectual disability with more knowledge about sexual behaviour are less likely to be victimised.

Our service applied for and was successful in obtaining a grant from the Victoria Law Foundation to produce quality resources that could be used widely to support these young people.

Our aim for the videos and accompanying resources is for these vulnerable young people to achieve greater understanding of the legal implications of both sexual consent and sharing of intimate images. As a result this will empower them with the knowledge to make informed decisions about sexual consent and reduce legal intervention and presentation at sexual assault services.

The videos won't be appropriate for all young people, however teachers, carers and parents will recognise when their teens are exploring relationships and sexuality and can use these tools to assist young people to understand the laws and promote further discussion.

Abby Spanos from Mallee Sexual Assault Service and Darren Jones and Heidi Milner from the Mildura Specialist School assisted during the development stage and they provided honest feedback and suggestions about the terms and language we should use in the videos and what level to target them. Their support was very important to ensure that the resources were respectful and appropriate and will be valuable to not only their students but other young people.

We received feedback from several Centres for Sexual Assault that they will be using the resources with peer support groups. It is not a use that we had considered initially but we are thrilled that the resources can be adapted in this way.

The resources have also been linked on the website of the Office of the Disability Services Commissioner (Victoria) and added to the organisational resources of AMAZE (peak body for people on the Autism speCentreum), Disability Advocacy Victoria, Assessments Australia and other individual services.

We are very excited that we have been contacted by the Australian Government Department of Education and Training who would like to feature our resources on their national wellbeing hub for all students in Australia. They had been shown the resources by the Office of the eSafety Commissioner and contacted us stating that they only featured best practice, high quality resources on their site and would like to license or formally access ours. This arrangement is still being formalised but it is significant recognition for our service.

To date the Consent video has had 819 unique views on YouTube, Sexting 382 unique views and we have distributed approximately 300 of each of the factsheets and postcards.







Case Studies:

Help to recover a child

A mother of two children sought assistance for a recovery order when her partner refused to return the children following a visit interstate. The mother lives in a remote part of our catchment and the matter came through to our service the week that the Federal Circuit Court was sitting in Mildura. Working alongside domestic violence services, our service was able to prepare her recovery documents for filing whilst keeping the mother in her town to alleviate the stresses of travel associated with the matter. A recovery order was granted within two days of our service seeing the client for the first time and the children were returned to her care.

Help for a mother to overcome complex problems and care for her child

A client who was experiencing a complex set of problems including family violence, substance misuse and mental health issues came to our service for assistance to ensure she could have her child returned to her from a grandparent. Our legal practitioner and social worker assisted the client

to be able to maintain contact with the child whilst she sought help, including obtaining secure accommodation. Later, when her situation had stabilised our service initiated recovery proceedings for the return of the child. These proceedings were ultimately successful and the child was returned to the mother's care.

Integrated practice - supporting the whole person

A distressed and homeless client had expressed suicidal ideation while seeking advice for a tenancy related matter. The solicitor was able to get the MMCLS social worker to step into the interview to respond appropriately to keep the client safe and ensure he was provided with appropriate support and immediate referral to mental health services. The solicitor continued to support the client with his legal need while the social worker provided emotional support through the legal process and transitioned him to other community supports. The legal matter was successfully concluded and the client has relocated to stable accommodation with good mental health supports.



Youth Solicitor Project

Our Youth Solicitor project is funded by the State Attorney-General's Office and aims to educate young people on a variety of legal issues regarding their rights and responsibilities. The project provides legal education and advice, links young people with the statewide service Youth law and offers them a valuable opportunity to understand what legal resources are available.

The Youth Solicitor project journey began well before the official start date of October 2015. The project really commenced in July 2015 when MMCLS was invited to attend the Youth Service Providers Network meeting in Mildura. The meeting was a great opportunity not only to flag to the various services that we wanted to launch a new project, focusing on the young people of the Mallee but also to obtain feedback to help us determine what the various services thought were the most pressing legal issues faced by the young people they work with.

Legal issues faced by young people can range from family violence and personal safety to workplace rights and responsibilities. Other issues include cyberbullying, legal issues with underage consensual sex, dealing with fines, debt and rights and responsibilities when dealing with police. MMLCS is proud of the work that we have done for the young people in the community.

To date, in the role of Youth Solicitor I have provided advice sessions, conducted community education at local schools as well as casework for young people both at the MMCLS office on Ninth Street and at outreach locations including at Sunraysia TAFE. Through regular outreach I was available at the Mildura campus to help with students' legal issues.

Since funding for the project was extended we have expanded the project to Swan Hill and are now connecting with the local youth service providers, including Headspace and TAFE to better service youth in the southern Mallee.

I have also worked with CLE worker Allie Collyer to attend monthly Zoe Support meetings, providing information and advice to young mothers who are being supported with life skills to continue their education. This has resulted in young women coming to the service for advice on legal concerns. I was invited to attend the inaugural Youth Affairs Council of Victoria's Rural Conference in Ballarat where I was able to showcase the set of videos and printed material developed by our Community Legal Education Worker, Allie Collyer, that were targeted to assist young people with intellectual disabilities navigate sexual consent and image based abuse.

In addition to attending the Youth Service Providers Network meeting, I also attended local community events such as the Youth by Youth expo facilitated by Mildura Rural City Council, and the 2018 National Association of Community Legal Centres (NACLC) Conference.

Intervention Order Support Service (10ss)

Through the Intervention Order Support Service we have attended 126 Court sittings, provided 142 services to 109 clients, 70% of whom were women.

Since 2015, our generalist service has provided a duty lawyer service to our courts to assist people applying for Intervention Orders and Personal Safety Orders, across the northern and southern regions of Victoria and southwest New South Wales. During the last year we attended court sittings in Mildura weekly, monthly in Robinvale and Kerang, fortnightly in Swan Hill and as required in Wentworth. We utilise this opportunity to visit family violence service providers and conduct pre-arranged appointments with clients.

Our solicitors are supported by our social work team, who have attended court in most cases and been able to provide additional support and referral pathways for clients where appropriate. This has allowed us to provide a more holistic and integrated model of service delivery, to people experiencing family violence.

The Mildura Court has introduced a weekly meeting for legal practitioners, police and support personnel, prior to Intervention Order hearing dates, to review the list, advise of any safety concerns and indicate where a conflict exists. This assists to keep the court environment safer and reduces the risk of court staff referring a client to our service on a sitting day when there is an established conflict. This planning enables clients to seek alternative assistance earlier.
